2022 - 2023 BUDGET NEWSLETTER

Dear District Residents:

As **Proposition I,** The Board of Education submits the 2022-2023 District Expenditures for community approval. The \$19,379,011 proposed expenditure represents an increase of \$1,191,779 or 6.55% more than last year's budget.

Two of the largest increases reflected in this year's budget continue to be from the areas of employee benefits and our instructional program. Both the SRP and MWTA bargaining units are actively working with the District to explore any and all cost containment options. We did see a fairly significant increase in our occupational education program costs as student enrollment in BOCES programs continues to increase. This is well worth the cost as these technical programs are immensely valuable for our students' post graduation plans. Overall we are maintaining most of our staffing although we will not be replacing one position being vacated due to retirement in our high school social studies department.

Thankfully, our foundation aid revenue has seen a significant increase as New York State has agreed to implement full funding over a two year period. Our increase this year is \$564,376 and we will hopefully see the same increase the following year. We will continue to use a fund balance allocation of \$810,000. The combined revenue increases and fund balance allocation will allow the District to stay under the allowable tax cap of 2.805% with a recommended tax levy increase of \$115,500 or 2.501%.

We are continuing to utilize the American Rescue Plan Act funds according to our plan. We are highly focused on providing additional opportunities for our students through after school programs and summer enrichment opportunities.

Proposition II is the election of two members to the nine (9) member Board of Education. One seat is a full five year term and the other is for the remaining two years of a vacated seat. We are extremely grateful to Brian Hammond and Tina Bush for their dedication and years of service to our students and community. There are two candidates who have filed petitions to seek the two available seats. On the ballot this year will be Amber Sullivan and Robert Smith. The candidate with the higher vote count will take the 5 year seat and the candidate with the lower vote count will finish out the 2 year term.

Proposition III requests community approval for the purchase of two 72-passenger buses. Bus costs are definitely increasing and we are looking at a State mandate that may require all bus purchases to be zero emission by 2027. This would certainly represent a large cost increase for purchases as well as infrastructure upgrades. We will continue to closely monitor this situation and actively seek out any available funding. Our 2022-23 bus purchases will have no effect on the tax levy as they will be funded by the District's Transportation and Equipment Capital Reserve. The district's transportation expenses are 90% reimbursable by the State.

Proposition IV seeks community approval to continue the process of engaging in an annual capital outlay project. Districts in New York State are allowed to conduct yearly capital outlay projects that cost no more than \$100,000 with voter approval. Capital outlay projects are reimbursed at our building aid ratio which is currently 90% so the net cost to the district is approximately \$10,000. This year's project will continue our window replacement schedule in the elementary wing. The reimbursement from last year's project provides 90% of the funding for the new project and the remaining funds will be taken from our building reserve so as to not affect the tax levy.

Propositions to be voted on May 17, 2022

PROPOSITION I: BUDGET

Shall the Board of Education of the Madrid-Waddington Central School be authorized to expend the sum of \$19,379,211 for the 2022 -2023 school year and to levy the necessary tax for this purpose.

PROPOSITION II: BOARD OF EDUCATION

- The election of two (2) members to the nine (9) member Board of Education.
- One (1) five-year term and one (1) unexpired two-year are open.
- Candidates include the following:

Amber Sullivan Robert Smith

The ballot will be accepting write-in candidates.

PROPOSITION III: BUS PURCHASE

Resolved that the Board of Education of the Madrid-Waddington Central School District be authorized and directed to purchase two (2) 72-passenger buses expend therefore an aggregate sum, not to exceed \$285,000; which sum shall be raised by tax on the taxable property of the District; and

That the Board of Education be authorized to expend funds from the existing Transportation and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund to fund the cost of the buses in whole or part; and

That the Board of Education be authorized in accordance with the provisions of the Education and Local Finance Law to borrow on the credit of the District a sum, not to exceed \$285,000, to fund the cost of the buses to issue obligations of the District not to exceed that amount to finance the purchase of the buses in whole or part.

PROPOSITION IV: CAPITAL OUTLAY

Resolved that the Board of Education of the Madrid-Waddington Central School District be authorized and directed to expend up to \$100,000 from the Building Reserve in part or whole which includes the removal of windows in select classrooms and offices and installation of new thermally broken, aluminum double hung windows with insulated glass. The size and color of the new windows will match the existing windows. Work will also include painting the existing steel lintels above the windows and sealing the perimeter of the window units.

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The budget is organized into three sections: Administrative, Program and Capital.

The Administrative Budget includes all expenses for managing and organizing the affairs of our school system. Examples of administrative expenses include administrator and secretary salaries, attorney and payroll service fees, professional development activities, copying costs and benefits.

Program Budget is the most comprehensive element of our financial plan. Program includes all expenses associated with providing an education to the children and young people of our community. Examples of program expenses include classroom instruction, field trips, special education services for disabled children, textbooks, computer technology, art, music and athletics.

The Capital Budget includes all expenses required to maintain a safe facility. Bond payments are also part of this category. Examples of capital expenses include bus driver training, bus maintenance, building safety inspections, fire prevention, maintenance and custodial salaries & benefits, fuel, power and water.
